## Pilgrimage to Headquarters: A New (Nu) Annual Tradition

In January, Nu Chapter embarked on its inaugural candidate class pilgrimage to the Sigma Nu National Fraternity Headquarters in Lexington, Virginia. Designed by the undergraduate chapter, this pilgrimage served as the final formative experience before the candidates' initiation.

The group departed Lawrence, Kansas, early on the morning of January 16th for a 15-hour bus ride to Virginia. The candidate class—composed primarily of freshmen—was accompanied by upperclassmen holding executive leadership roles, including the future commander. Representing the alumni chapter were Corporation Board President Mark Mustoe, Chapter Advisor Kyle Svoboda, and myself. In total, nearly 50 men represented Nu Chapter on this historic retreat.

Lexington is a quaint, historic town steeped in Civil War heritage. It is home to Washington and Lee University and the Virginia Military Institute—two remarkably different campuses separated by a road scarcely wider than a golf cart path. The Sigma Nu Fraternal Estate sits atop the highest point in Lexington, offering panoramic views of downtown and the surrounding academic institutions. The undergraduate members were housed in the Spears Family Epsilon Epsilon Center for Excellence. The Spears Center contained a barracks for the undergraduates, kitchen and dining facilities and educational classrooms.

During the visit, Brother Svoboda discovered a compelling collection of essays in the Sigma Nu library from 1914 titled College Life: Its Conditions and Problems. Remarkably, many of the challenges discussed—related to student life and fraternities—mirror contemporary issues. One essay, The Value of the College Fraternity, written by Professor Elbridge Colby of Columbia University, stood out. Colby wrote:

"It is manifestly unfair that the American college fraternity should have been advertised throughout the country in its worst light—and only so... Thus [Henry David] Thoreau never read the newspapers because he said it was nothing more than gossip, and gossip is never representative. So the fraternity has become the victim of a kind of yellow journalism—of a pernicious kind, for the permanency and dignity of a published book over the passing of a news-sheet seems to lend weight and authority to arguments advanced." (p. 341)





While fraternities today are often associated with negative head-lines—ranging from hazing to poor academic integrity—Nu Chapter is intentionally setting itself apart from these narratives. Our chapter is being elevated through a leadership culture grounded in Love, Truth, and Honor.

The pilgrimage included leadership development workshops, historical sessions, and tours of the Washington and Lee and VMI campuses. Highlights included visits to historic sites at VMI where Sigma Nu founders Hopkins, Quarles, and Riley established the Legion of Honor in secrecy. The leadership training began with a keynote address by Brad Beacham, Executive Director of Sigma Nu National Fraternity. Brother Beacham shared the significant contributions of Nu Chapter's founding brothers—Perlee Rawson Bennett, Grant Harrington, and Walter J. Sears—to the national fraternity following the Civil War. Most importantly, he articulated the deep responsibility and high expectations that come with being a member of Nu Chapter.

Additional sessions covered The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People, values and ethics, time management, and team-building exercises. In the evenings, the undergraduates enjoyed time for fellowship, including poker tournaments and a Chiefs watch party. The overall experience rivaled top-tier corporate leadership retreats in both structure and impact.

We are excited to continue this meaningful tradition in January 2026 with next year's candidate class. As Professor Colby so eloquently stated:

"In college, the fraternity stands for a coordination and settling; it takes the young man in the four best years of his life and helps him to understand, and to become what he seriously intends to be." (p. 349)

Through intentional leadership training and a commitment to values, Nu Chapter is building a culture that sets it apart—not only at the University of Kansas, but across the nation.

#### JC Hixon, Nu #1190

Joseph Charles (J.C.) Hixon Nu 1190 1965 died peacefully, surrounded by family, on January 14, 2025, in Denver CO at age 79.

He grew up on farmland in St. Francis Kansas where he developed a love of the outdoors, including hunting and golf, two passions he pursued for the rest of his life. Each fall he would return to his hometown to hunt pheasants with old friends. An outstanding marksman JC earned numerous first place medals in clay pigeon shooting tournaments in Colorado.

He was a decorated high school athlete excelling in track and football. JC set, and still holds, the Kansas high school record for the 100 yard dash at 9.7 seconds. He will hold

that record forever as track races moved to the metric system.

He received a football scholarship to KU and played alongside notable players including Gayle Sayers, John Riggins, Bobby Douglas and fellow Nu Chapter brother Sandy Buda. After graduation JC and Sandy coached KU football as assistants under head coach Pepper Rodgers. While at KU he met his wife, Sherril, and they married in 1970.

He had a long career in Finance and Real Estate. First as a bond manager in Kansas City and Denver for The Hartford and later as a board member for the Pauls Corp., a property management company.

JC leaves behind his wife Sherril, his daughter Jill, son Brett and three grandchildren.











## Alumni Attend Spring 2025 Initiation



the active chapter officers, this role is especially for you. Contact Kyle at (636) 219-3803.




